GROWING IN FAITH RETREAT – NEW YORK DIAKONIA



On November 3, deaconesses Lois Jenkins and Masayo Kagita journeyed to West Hartford, CT to attend a retreat given by the New York Diakonia. Lois and Masayo are graduates of the Growing in Faith program which is a two-year process of spiritual formation and theological education for baptized members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. It is also available for anyone wishing in good faith to study Lutheran teachings. The program provides an engaging learning experience with the goal of increasing knowledge of the Bible and church history, deepening personal faith, and providing clarity for

our role as God's people in this world. People attending the program often form close friendships with other students as they make their faith journey. The Growing in Faith retreat was a great way to get away from distractions, meet up with past and present classmates, and spend time in worship and reflection. SERVICE OF HEALING

On October 22, Trinity held a Service of Healing. This is a special worship service during which people are invited to approach the altar for prayer and anointing. Many did come forward to receive physical or spiritual healing. Pastor Lemke anointed each one with chrism oil which is traditionally a mixture of olive oil, balsam resin and frankincense. A prayer is said to bless the oil and it is applied to the forehead. This is a very old ritual that was also a practice of the early Christian church.

"Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord." - James 5:14





Doris Tegge attended a training session for Performers in Sacred Places on November 4. Performers in Sacred Places is an organization dedicated to matching artists of various disciplines to religious organizations that have spaces that are not being used every day. All participants in the program are required to attend a training session. Much of the training is focused on matching the right performer with the right space. It's not just about how big the room is. It is important that the performers and churches share the same mission and values. To that end, each organization compiled a list of their vision, values, mission, and the impact they hope to make. It was surprising to see how much of the performers' lists matched those of the churches. Common themes were community, inclusivity, empathy, respect, transformation, healing, nurture, and hope. The training also included a legal presentation on space use agreements. It covered legal considerations, contracts, and examples.

WATER LEAKS

The roof was inspected and was in need of repair. Repairs were made, but leaking persisted. It was then determined that water was leaking from the sprinkler system. The leak was fixed. NOTES AND REFLECTIONS

JESUS PROMISED: I WILL... Testament, Jesus makes many promis



Throughout the New Testament, Jesus makes many promises. He often expresses these promises by saying "I will." There are over 30 "I will" statements in the New Testament, each one stating a beautiful promise from the Lord. Here we list 10 of the "I will".

- 1. **I will** not leave you as orphans; I will come to you. (John 14:18)
- 2. Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and <u>I will</u> give you rest. (Matthew 11: 28)
- 3. The one who loves me will be loved by my Father, and <u>I too will</u> love them and show myself to them. (John 14: 21)
- 4. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away. (Luke 21:33)

- 5. **I will** send the Holy Spirit to you. (John 16:7)
- 6. <u>I will</u> show you what he is like who comes to me and hears my words and puts them into practice" (Luke 6:47). (Here Jesus promised his guidance to understand truth.)
- 7. <u>I will</u> do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it. (John 14: 13)
- 8. If you love me, keep my commands. And <u>I will</u> ask the Father, and he will give you another advocate to help you and be with you forever. (John 14: 15)
- 9. "Come, follow me," Jesus said, "and <u>I will</u> send you out to fish for people." At once they left their nets and followed him. (Matt 4:18) (As Jesus was walking beside the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon called Peter and his brother Andrew. They were casting a net into the lake, for they were fishermen.)
- 10. <u>I will</u> see you again and you will rejoice, and no one will take away your joy. (John 16:22)

SEEING JESUS IN MY NEIGHBOR

"Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?' "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.' (Matt. 25:37-40. Please read the whole text Matt. 25:31-46 about Jesus' Second Coming)

Years ago at a Special Olympics event in the US, nine young contestants who had disabilities (PWDs) lined up at the starting line for the 100 meter dash. When the starting gun fired, they all started off in their best effort toward the finish line.

But one boy stumbled, fell to the ground, and could not get up. As he began to cry, two other racers heard him. They looked back and without hesitation turned around and ran toward the injured boy.

As the other PWD contestants struggled to the finish line, the two came to the boy and helped him to his feet. They then linked arms and together walked to the finish line. By the time the trio reached the end, everyone in the stands was standing and cheering, some with tears rushing down their faces.

The two who had helped the boy had lost their chance to win the race, but they knew that they had done the right thing. (A true story that happened at the 1976 Special Olympics in Seattle, Washington.)

Sometimes running towards our personal goals can make us ignore the needs of other people around us – our family members, friends, or even strangers. Stopping to help a neighbor in need becomes an

inconvenience and may prevent us from reaching the finish line. Like the Levite or priest on the road to Jericho (Luke 10:25-37), we do not want to complicate our lives by helping the half-dead man attacked by robbers who needs our help.

The Lord Jesus has promised that He will come again – not as a baby in the manger but as King and Judge. Our Savior first came to earth to suffer the shame and pain of crucifixion for our sake – redeeming us from sin, death, Satan, and hell.

By God's grace through faith in Him, Jesus fills our heart with love and compassion especially for the weak and downtrodden. He will come again and we will make an accounting of how we have shown our faith by deeds of love for our neighbor. Meanwhile, the Holy Spirit opens our eyes to see Jesus in the "least of our brothers and sisters" and help them as we are able.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, forgive me for not helping my neighbor in need because it would inconvenience me. Let my heart be open and my hands ready to help the neediest around me. In Jesus' Name. Amen.

Reflection: When have you been hungry, or sick or lonely and someone came and helped you? How did it feel? How does that experience help you be sensitive to the needs of others and want to help them?
