EPIPHANY BLESSING OF THE CHURCH

Blessing the house on Epiphany is a Christian tradition that goes back many centuries. It is a simple ritual that asks Christ's blessing on the home, in this case our sanctuary. First a scripture verse is recited from the Gospel of John, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace." (John 1:1-4, 14, 16)

An inscription is marked over the entryway in chalk: 20+CMB+24 The 20+24 is the current year. CMB stands for *Christus Mansionem Benedicat* or Christ Bless this House. Then we pray for Christ's blessing on the house and all who enter. You can see the chalk markings over all the entrances to the church. House blessing kits are available in the narthex for those who want to ask for Christ's blessing on their own home. This is a simple and lovely ritual that reminds people that we don't leave our faith behind when we leave the church building, but our homes can also be expressions of the love of Christ.



TRINITY TOWN HALL

On January 28, Trinity held a Town Hall. 19 members were present, 13 in church and 6 on Zoom. Topics discussed included:

- Whether the clothing box be removed. Items are being left outside of the box. There has also been concern in the community about theft from the box.
- The leak in the sexton's apartment by the sprinkler pipe. The contractor will be contacted to resolve the issue.
- New folding chairs are needed because the present ones are breaking and disappearing. Possible opportunities for donations to buy new chairs were explored.
- Pastor Lemke spoke about the Transition Team. This team is a necessary part in preparation for the call of a permanent pastor. A meeting will be arranged with Mother Gladys and the Transition Team. Anyone interested in serving on the Transition Team should contact the church office.
- Pastor Lemke spoke about all the organizations that are regularly meeting at Trinity. In addition, more Production Companies are interested in using our space. This is an important source of income for Trinity.
- The settings for the liturgy. Some people find the musical settings hard to follow. Suggestions for changes will be reviewed by the Worship and Music Committee.
- AA was thanked for their donation.

SPRITUAL REFLECTIONS

"COME AND SEE"

The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. He met Philip and said to him, "Follow me." Philip was from the town of Bethsaida, the same as Andrew and Peter. 45 Philip found Nathanael and told him, "We have found the man that Moses wrote about in the law. The prophets wrote about him too. He is Jesus, the son of Joseph. He is from Nazareth."

But Nathanael said to Philip, "Nazareth! Can anything good come from Nazareth?" Philip answered, "Come and see." Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward him and said, "This man coming is a true Israelite, one you can trust." Nathanael asked, "How do you know me?"

Jesus answered, "I saw you when you were under the fig tree, before Philip told you about me." Then Nathanael said, "Teacher, you are the Son of God. You are the King of Israel." (John 1:43-49 ERV)

After meeting and knowing Jesus of Nazareth, the Person that Moses and the prophets wrote about Who will redeem Israel, Philip wanted to share the good news with his friend, Nathanael. But his enthusiasm was met by Nathanael's sarcasm, who said, "Nazareth! Can anything good come from Nazareth?"

Many Israelites shared Nathanael's low regard for Nazareth. It was an obscure, forgotten town in Galilee, far from Jerusalem, the center of Jewish religious life. Nazareth was unknown even in the Hebrew Scriptures.

Although probably surprised by Nathanael's reply, Philip did not patronize or argue with him. He did not cite any scriptural verses to persuade Nathanael. He just said, "Come and see."

Nathanael agreed to meet Jesus and that changed his whole life. Jesus seemed to know everything about him - his nononsense honesty and truthfulness, even his routine of sitting under a fig tree. (Many Jews would plant a fig tree in their front yard and sit under its shade to study and pray.)

Probably inspired by the Holy Spirit, he realizes only God could know his personality and details of his daily life. He acknowledges Jesus' divinity and confesses Him as the Son of God and the King of Israel – the Promised Messiah! This was a radical reversal for Nathanael -- from sarcasm and unbelief to faith.

Nathanael became one of the Twelve disciples of Jesus. The invitation to him has changed from "Come and see" to "Come and follow Me."

Our preconceived ideas can inhibit us in sharing the Gospel. We do not want to sound "religious or too holy;" we are afraid to be asked difficult questions. But it is not about us; it is about God's love offered to everyone despite the problems in finances, relationships, health or even loneliness. It is about God's grace in Christ who offered His life on the Cross so that through faith in Him, anyone can find forgiveness for sin and be reconciled with God.

Our role is simply to invite the "Philips" around us to "come and see" Jesus and what He is doing in our life -- nothing fancy, nothing complex. We have God's promise that the Holy Spirit will teach us the words to say when the time comes (Lk. 12:11-12).

Prayer: Dear God, sustain us in our desire to invite others to come and see Jesus in our life with Him. In His Name. Amen.

Reflection: Jesus knows you by name and every detail of your life. How does this fact affect your view of the problems you are facing now?
